#### Lent Can Have a Lighter Side - Sort of

A few weeks ago, many of us participated in a holy ritual – Ash Wednesday. Signing the ash cross on another person is somber and sacred and poignant. But for a church minister, it can be potentially a logistical nightmare. In one of my first teaching jobs, I worked in a large private Catholic school and besides teaching religion, I was made Campus Minister in charge of all things that had to do with Church, the liturgy, and the sacraments. I was fairly green in that capacity, and when Lent was drawing near, I had to plan our Ash Wednesday Mass which would be attended by about 1,200 students, faculty, and staff. As the date approached, I began searching the sacristy of our large and beautiful school chapel – checking all the various drawers and cubby-holes but couldn't find any ashes. So where do I get some? Many things swirled in my brain: What do I mix with the ashes? How many distributors will I need to put them on everyone's forehead? Where are the little dishes to put them in? *Remember I was new at this!* 

Then someone told me that you are supposed to burn palm branches from the previous year's Palm Sunday and use those ashes. Well - the teacher in me loves the symbolism of this. The palm branches that signify the joy of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem are saved and transformed into the ashes we use in a blessing that brings life, as it reminds us of our own mortality. Unfortunately, being the klutz I am, no matter how hard I tried,



I apparently could not burn palm branches. And I did try. But I ended up with awkward, sooty chunks of plant and a very smoky church building and a confused religion class. Thank God I didn't set off the sprinklers. A friend later informed me that — should I ever do it again — I should burn the palm leaves outside - an important safety tip.

So, I ended up going to the church supply store and buying some ashes, although somehow that didn't seem right. They come in tiny plastic baggies with a number sticker on the front – 500, 1000, etc.. How do they know that tiny bag will cross 1000 people? Is there a test market? But I must say, those ashes lasted me for several years at that job and – like the jar of flour in the story of Elijah and the widow of Zarapeth – the ash jar never seemed to run out. Mind you, my ash incompetence is not something I dwell on, but at the time, that smoky church felt like a "campus minister fail" as I ran to open every window in the place! Which is why I was delighted to read a recent story online of pastors' similar ash disasters. That's the term one desperate pastor used to describe a tip his housekeeper gave him once about making a last-minute trip to the pharmacy to buy black eye shadow. She said: "In the secrecy of your church office, chip that little cake of makeup out into your ash bowl and add a little olive oil." As I read it, every fiber of my being cried out - NO! In the same article, another pastor shared the following tip: "If you run out of ashes DON'T use the soil from a nearby potted plant! That's what one of our hospital chaplains did when he ran out of ashes one year, and the soil had fertilizer in it. A nurse had an allergic reaction to the fertilizer and had to check in to the ER! Seriously. Not to mention the smell. Those poor people who came for ashes that day. So, to recap: burned palm branches: YES. Potting soil: NO! Eye shadow: Big NO!

However, there is a true story about a Pastor in Chicago who found himself needing last minute ashes — like an hour before Mass. Apparently, he had read the same article and headed off to CVS in his black cassock and white collar. When he got there, he realized he couldn't remember what makeup item he needed, and asked rather loudly: 'Where can I get some mascara?!' Heads turned. Luckily, he did find black eye shadow. When he returned with it, he showed his secretary and asked if he had bought the right thing, at which point she said — 'I think you were supposed to buy eye shadow without glitter.' Ooops. But as they were too late to do anything else, they mixed it in anyway, and had lovely dark ashes with a hint of glitter, which were sparkly on a beautiful sunny Ash Wednesday. I'm sure that they broke any number of Canon Laws that day, but it became for many of the school children at Mass, and maybe for the grown-ups, too, a sign that even in the darkness of death, the light of Christ shines through."

Is that a stretch? I'm not so sure it is. Because - isn't that what this season of Lent is all about? The darkness and the light. The grief and the joy, the soot and the beauty, the death and the life, the human and the divine – they weave in and around and within each other all the time, and during Lent we are called to open our eyes and our hearts just a bit wider to receive it all.
