But if someone were to rise from the dead...

During Lent, we are called to self-examination and reflection, and that can truly be challenging. Are we living our lives focused on Jesus? Could we be doing something more to lead others to our Savior? Have we from time to time walked away from Jesus? Those thought-provoking questions are addressed with frightening reality in Luke's Gospel story of the rich man and Lazarus. It asks the question: shall we commit to God or to the world - and what are the consequences of that choice?

In the story, there is a rich man who, having ignored the poor beggar Lazarus at his door during his life on earth, was now suffering in eternal fire. The former rich man sees Abraham in paradise with Lazarus and pleads with him: "I beg you, Father Abraham, send Lazarus to my house where I have five brothers, so that he might warn them not to end up in this place of torment!" Abraham replies: "Your brothers have Moses and the prophets — they should listen to them!" But the rich man insists: "But if someone from the dead goes to warn them, then they will repent." The reply of Abraham to the rich man's plea has so much to say about us and our world today, and those who turn a deaf ear to the Gospel: "If they won't listen to Moses and the prophets, then they won't

listen to anyone — even if someone were to rise from the dead." My friend Miguel, a lay pastor at a Catholic Parish in a small town on the edge of the desert in rural Nevada - had to work at church that afternoon and drove to McDonalds for lunch in this old car he loved — a 1978 Chevy Camaro. It had a great engine which he rebuilt, but had faded upholstery, an AM Radio, and no air conditioning. He loved that car even if he had to drive it in the desert with all 4 windows down! On that 102-degree day, he got out of his car and walked to the McDonalds. At the door he saw a homeless man panhandling for money. He looked disheveled, and dirty and my friend tried to avoid him. But the man kept following behind him,



Finally, Miguel said he'd bring him out a sandwich and a drink. But the man insisted on following him in. Miguel ordered the man some food and he sat down and invited Miguel to eat with him. But annoyed by his looks and his horrible smell and embarrassed to be seen with him, Miguel begged off saying he had to get back to church for a meeting. The man smiled and sat at a table happily eating his lunch. Miguel felt relieved he got away without having to eat with such an undesirable person. Miguel walked back to his old car, drove down the street a way, parked and began eating his lunch. Even with the windows rolled down, he could feel the heat of the day and he began to perspire heavily. From the car, he could see the McDonalds a block and a half away and could just make out the figure of the man sitting there having his burger, fries, and Coke. Miguel thought to himself: "Look at him! He's sitting in air-conditioned comfort and here I am eating my lunch in this hot, unbearable place of torment!"

And wouldn't you know it? That evening at the Saturday Mass, the gospel was that of the rich man and Lazarus! As the Lector read: "Oh - Father Abraham – have Lazarus dip the tip of his finger in cool water to touch my tongue – for I am in this place of torment," Miguel told me that - although he'd heard that gospel story many times – he heard it for the first time with a new meaning that evening. As tears flowed down his face, he wondered if he, that very day, had chosen to walk away from Jesus.

We can choose the world and the terrifying future of the rich man's destiny in an eternity filled with anguish with no hope for escape, or we can choose God - and look forward to Lazarus' destiny of eternal comfort in God's presence. As this story explains, these consequences hold true regardless of what we are currently facing in our lives. Our choices, not our circumstances, determines the outcome.

So where does all this lead us in this Lenten time of self-examination and reflection? Is it possible that we too have walked away from His astonishing gift of salvation and love? Are we living our lives with a heart fully committed to Jesus? Or have we allowed the world to seep into our heart and replace true faithfulness to our Father in heaven with allegiance to the lies of sin and death? It may not be a Big Mac, fries, and a Coke, but it is food for thought! May your Lenten journey continue to be one of discovery of what it means to walk toward the Savior.
