How are we dealing with the chasm?

The *Mission District* of San Francisco- is a historically working class inner city neighborhood of immigrants, artists, and people caught up in the struggles of displacement, addiction and poverty. Since the dot.com boom of the late '90's it has become a mecca for young wealthy techies, which has resulted in stark contrasts between the rich and the poor in the area. Last year ten people died by violence within six blocks of the often well-populated *Starbucks* in the area, and last year the multi-billionaire founder of Facebook, Mark Zuckerberg, bought a house in the very neighborhood where people regularly stand on street corners begging.

One of my favorite Gospel stories is the parable of the Rich Man and Lazarus from the Gospel of Luke – you know the story. Lazarus begs at the rich man's door, yet is offered no food or help binding up his wounds. And this is Jesus' story-telling at its best, with Lazarus in such a pathetic state that dogs are licking his open sores. When the rich man dies, he is taken to hell and looks up to see Lazarus in heaven. He begs Lazarus to bring him a cool cup of water for he is in fiery torment. But Abraham tells the rich man that he had all the good things in life while Lazarus had none. And besides – even if he wanted to, there is a great chasm separating heaven and hell – and no one is able to cross over.

Many have noted the growing chasm between wealth and poverty in our country and most of us, whether we live in a city, suburb, or out in the country, now see homeless neighbors begging on a daily basis. We all live, to some extent, in a type of uncomfortable tension between the rich man and Lazarus.

There is a prominent Coffee Bar in the *Mission District*, where <u>Instagram</u> was launched and tech billionaires wearing hooded sweatshirts sip coffee over casual meetings to discuss venture capital investments and new startups. Coffee is only two bucks - and there are families, older people and an occasional homeless neighbor sitting amidst the sea of shiny silver laptops. The many homeless people outside the coffee bar would not be able to fathom the billions of dollars being discussed there over cappuccino's and lattes. Now I'm not the richest or the poorest person, but somehow it's easier to compare myself with those who have more, than with those who have less. If I'm honest with myself, I'm most like the rich man in the Jesus' story. When I see someone begging like poor Lazarus, I must admit, it can make me feel uncomfortable. There are rare occasions when I make a "heroic" effort to look a begging person in the eye and recognize them as the child of God that they are, offering conversation and some help. But more often I avert my eyes and walk on.

When I was a kid, my Dad owned a grocery story in Over-the-Rhine at Vine and Liberty streets – at that time a pretty gritty neighborhood. He tells the story of how poor beggars would come in the store asking him for money. He knew they would just take the money and go down the street to a bar, so, instead, he made them sandwiches and gave them coffee. One day he noticed that after they left his place with the sandwiches, they walked across the street to St. Francis Monastery and the priest in charge would give them money anyway - and they promptly took their sandwiches and cash, dumped the coffee, and walked down to the bar. When my Dad crossed over Vine Street and confronted the priest, he said to my father "You work your side of the street – and I'll work mine!" *Hmmmm?!* How different is each person's own point of view!

There's a bit of *karma* going on in that rich man and Lazarus story. The rich man ignored the pleas of Lazarus the beggar, and now he is the one begging for a drink of water and is denied. As a master teacher, Jesus told stories like this to awaken longing in his listeners, to help them turn the switch on, to desire to be people who see the beggar at the gate and to embrace the miracle of love. The punch line of that story is that when the rich man asks Abraham to send Lazarus to earth to warn his five brothers so they won't end up in hell, Abraham says that they should listen to Moses and the Prophets. But the rich man begs – "but if someone were to rise from the dead – then my brothers would listen. Abraham says in reply "If they don't listen to Moses and the Prophets – they won't listen to anyone – even if someone were to rise from the dead!" Do we listen to the One who rose from the dead?

What is the great chasm between the rich man and Lazarus, the gap between the place of the living and the dead? *Do we create these chasms when we think of anyone as less worthy of compassion than we are?*


We will then go back to the classrooms for final summer preparations. At 12:15, you are invited to sign your child(ren) out from their homerooms for our family picnic out on the field. **You are welcome to take your child(ren) home after lunch**. (If it rains, the picnic will be held inside.)

The cafeteria will have a brown bag style lunch and milk available for students to purchase or students can pack their own lunch from home. Adults/family members can bring their own lunches to enjoy with the students.

We understand not all parents are able to attend our picnic, so teachers will have lunch with students whose parents are unable to attend. They will supervise them until dismissal at 2:50 p.m. Buses will be running at their normal times for those students.

Meal Accounts as the School Year Wraps Up

- Meal Money Will Carry Over- Any money on your child's lunch account at the end of the year will automatically carry over to next school year.
- Graduating 8th Graders Accounts- Money left in 8th grade accounts will be automatically transferred to a younger sibling in the same household. If there is no sibling, the cafeteria staff will be contacting 8th grade parents as graduation approaches to make arrangements for a refund or to donate remaining funds to a younger student.
- Students Who Are Not Returning Next Year- Please contact the school cafeteria before the last week of school to arrange for a refund of any remaining money. Refunds will be made during the last week of school.
- K-12 Payment System Closes for Summer- During the summer, K-12 Payment Accounts cannot be viewed or money added to accounts until the next school year approaches. The K-12 Payment System utilizes the summer break to update their website and features.


