If ANYONE in your house is being tested for COVID, YOUR CHILD CANNOT COME TO SCHOOL UNTIL THE PERSON BEING TESTED RECEIVES A NEGATIVE TEST RESULT.

Parents are required to inform the school within 24 hours if a student or someone in the student's home tests positive.

This is non-negotiable and applies to everyone.



While the Ohio Department of Health encourages but does not require Ohio schools to report numbers of positive cases, we believe sharing these numbers **each week** is a transparent way to help us all track the movement of the virus and better manage our

#### There Can Be No Greater Love - Than to Lay Down Your Life for a Friend

On this 20th anniversary of 9/11, I want to say a few words about Father Mychal (Michael) Judge. He was chaplain to the New York City Fire Department, and a true New York character. Born in Brooklyn, Mychal seemed to know everyone in the city, from the homeless to the Mayor. A recovering alcoholic, Mychal became the NYC Fire Department chaplain in 1992, and at his residence at his parish house, Judge's room was immaculate and spare. Every morning, he'd wake up at around 6:30 and give thanks to God for his sobriety. At Morning Prayer, he sat in the first row on the right, and prayed aloud for the city's workers: its bus drivers and subway workers, its councilmen and Mayor. He liked to preach from the first pew as well. "This was very significant," says Brian Carroll, a friend and fellow priest. "Because when you step out of the sanctuary, you're down with the people, eyeball to eyeball with them. As he often said: 'It

can get messy, it can get crazy, but it can be an awful lot of fun.' That was the New Yorker in him." Mike knew everyone in the city – from the mayor to the cab driver to his fellow recovering alcoholics – and he spent many hours witnessing his faith to them . On September 11, 2001, upon learning that the World Trade Center had been hit by the first of two jetliners, Father Judge rushed down to the site to be with his fellow firefighters. He was met there by the Mayor of New York City, who asked him to pray fo the city and its victims. Father Judge administered the Last Rites to some of the bodies lying on the streets, then entered the lobby of the World Trade Center North Tower, where an emergency command post had been organized.

There he continued offering aid and prayers for the rescuers, the injured and the dead. When the South Tower collapsed at 9:59 am, debris went flying through the North Tower lobby, killing many inside, including Father Mychal. Shortly after his death, an NYPD lieutenant found Judge's body. He and two firemen, an Emergency Medical Technician, and one civilian bystander then carried Judge's body out of the North Tower. Judge's body was laid before the altar of St. Peter's Catholic Church before being taken to the medical examiner. Mychal Judge was designated as "Victim 0001" and thereby recognized as the first official victim of the September 11, 2001 attacks. Other victims died before him including air crew, passengers, and occupants of the towers, but Judge was the first certified fatality because his was the first body to be recovered and taken to the medical examiner.

On September 15, 2001, 3,000 people attended Judge's funeral Mass at St. Francis of Assisi Church, which was presided over by Cardinal Edward Egan, the Archbishop of New York at that time. He said that "Mychal's death was a special loss. We should lift his life up as an example of what must prevail. We have to be more like Father Mike than the people who killed him." At a special Mass for FDNY Engine 73, Ladder 42, Bronx, NY – we recall what Father Mychal said in a homily: "Thank you, Lord for life. Thank you for love. Thank you for goodness. Thank you for work. Thank you for family. Thank you for friends. Thank you for every gift because we know that every gift comes from you, and without you, we have and are nothing. Let us enjoy each other's company, and most of all, let us be conscious of Your presence in our lives and in a special way in the lives of all those who have gone before us. That's the way it is. We will have good days and bad days. Up days and down days. Sad days and happy days. But never a boring day on this job. You do what God has called you to do. You show up. You put one foot in front of another. You get on the rig and you go out and you do the job - which is always a mystery and a surprise. You have no idea when you get on that rig. No matter how big the call. No matter how small. You have no idea what God is calling you to. But God needs you. God needs me. God needs all of us." - Father Mychal preached that prophetic homily on September 10, 2001 – the day before the attacks on the World Trade Center.

The Orthodox-Catholic Church of America declared Mychal a saint. His fire helmet was presented to Pope John Paul II. France awarded him the Légion d'honneur. Members of the United States Congress nominated him for the Congressional Gold Medal, as well as the Presidential Medal of Freedom. In 2002, the City of New York renamed the portion of West 31st Street where he lived as "Father Mychal F. Judge Street", and christened a commuter ferry the Father Mychal Judge in his honor. In 2002, the United States Congress passed The Mychal Judge Police and Fire Chaplains Public Safety Officers Benefit Act into law. The law extended federal death benefits to chaplains of police and fire departments. It's hard to believe that it's been 20 years since the tragedy of 9/11 - let us remember Father Judge and all the many heroes who died that day.
